Dear Parents and Friends of Manukau Christian School,

Welcome to 2025 at MCS! We are so pleased to have the opportunity to serve our parent community in training courageous disciples of Christ who are equipped with the knowledge and skills they need to see God's kingdom grow here in New Zealand.

As we begin a new school year at MCS, I would like to share with you an important biblical truth that shapes our approach to education and character development. It comes from the book of Proverbs—a book from the Bible that is filled with practical wisdom given from a father to a son, which offers insight into a well-ordered life for us all.

11 My son, do not despise the LORD's discipline or be weary of his reproof,

12 for the LORD reproves him whom he loves, as a father the son in whom he delights.

13 Blessed is the one who finds wisdom, and the one who gets understanding,

14 for the gain from her is better than gain from silver

and her profit better than gold.

15 She is more precious than jewels, and nothing you desire can compare with her. 16 Long life is in her right hand;

in her left hand are riches and honour.

17 Her ways are ways of pleasantness, and all her paths are peace.

18 She is a tree of life to those who lay hold of her; those who hold her fast are called blessed. *Proverbs 3:11-18* 

### 1. Discipline is Love

Our culture often views discipline as restrictive, but Scripture teaches that it is an expression of love. Proverbs reminds us that the Lord disciplines

those He loves, just as a loving parent disciplines their child. At MCS, we believe that firm but loving discipline is essential for our students' growth. Walking quietly between classes, using manners, standing aside at doors, being on time, and taking responsibility for their homework are small but significant ways that students learn discipline. These habits shape character and prepare them for future success.

As parents, you play a crucial role in this process. Supporting the school's expectations at home reinforces the values we teach in the classroom. When children experience consistency between school and home, the message goes that much deeper into their hearts and helps them develop resilience, respect, and self-discipline—qualities that will serve them well for life.



### 2. The Blessings of Wisdom

Discipline is not just about correcting behaviour—it is about imparting wisdom. The Bible tells us that wisdom is more valuable than silver or gold because it brings true prosperity. Wisdom leads to peace, honour, and a well-ordered life. However, children do not naturally desire wisdom. They are often drawn to what is easy or entertaining rather than what is good and true. That is why discipline is necessary— by it we help them recognize the greater blessings of wisdom over the fleeting pleasures of folly.

We see the difference that discipline and high expectations make. In schools where structure is weak and expectations are low, students struggle to reach their potential. New Zealand's education system faces challenges, with declining literacy and numeracy rates. Many young people are entering adulthood unprepared for the demands of life because they were not trained in discipline and perseverance. At MCS, we are committed to offering a different path. We maintain high academic and behavioural standards not out of harshness, but because we want the best for our students.



#### 3. A Shared Commitment to Excellence

As we embark on a new year together, I encourage you as parents to partner with us in this vision. By working together—parents, teachers, and students—we create an environment where wisdom flourishes. When children see that both their school and their home value discipline,

responsibility, and excellence, they thrive.

Let's make 2025 a year where we reaffirm our commitment to high standards, loving discipline, and the pursuit of wisdom. May our children grow in knowledge and character, experiencing the blessings that come from living according to God's wisdom.

Thank you for entrusting us with your child's education. We look forward to a year of growth, learning, and God's continued blessing at MCS.

### PE Dress Code



At MCS, we have a dress code for PE which allows our students to take part effectively in these lessons. Students are required to wear shorts and their house t-shirt as well as sneakers. Ensure you know what days your child has PE, and as we begin the year, remind them to have their PE gear in their bags on those days.

# Car Park Expectations for a Safe Start to the Year

As we begin the new school year, it's a good time to remind everyone—especially new families—of the rules and expectations for using the **primary school car park**. These guidelines are in place to ensure the safety of our students, particularly our youngest ones, and to maintain a smooth and efficient traffic flow.

### 1. Who May Use the Car Park and When

- Before 3:15pm: only parents or caregivers picking up students in Years 1 to 3 may park in the primary school car park. These vehicles must display a green car park permit. If you do not have a permit, please talk to us in the school office.
- After 3:15pm: other parents may enter and use the car park for pickup.

This rule is in place to help protect our youngest students, so that they do not have to walk outside the car park to be picked up.

### 2. Follow the Arrow System - No Exceptions

- All vehicles must follow the one-way arrow system at all times. Under no circumstances should anyone drive against the arrows.
- If no parking space is available, continue moving through the car park as per the flow of traffic and circle around until a space opens up.



### 3. Park Only in Designated Spaces

Do not park in non-designated areas, even temporarily. Parking outside of marked spaces causes congestion, disrupts traffic flow and creates unsafe conditions for children.

#### 4. Follow Staff Instructions

School staff will be on duty in the car park to help manage traffic and ensure student safety. If a staff member gives you an instruction, please follow it without argument. They are there for the safety of the children, and their directions should be respected.

### 5. A Call for Christian Courtesy

At Manukau Christian School, we uphold biblical principles of loving our neighbours. This means using the car park with a mindset of consideration and cooperation, rather than frustration or impatience.



- Follow the rules for the benefit of all.
- Think of others, not just your own convenience.
- Be patient and respectful to fellow parents, staff, and students.

By following these guidelines, we ensure that our car park remains a safe, efficient, and positive environment for our school community. Thank you for your cooperation!

# Outstanding Academic Results from 2024

Over the Christmas holidays, we received our **Cambridge examination results,** and we are delighted to share an update with our school community.

At Manukau Christian School, we are unapologetically results-driven because pursuing academic excellence is a core part of our mission. But what does that actually mean?

Academic excellence is not just an abstract goal—it is something measurable, something we constantly evaluate to ensure that we are fulfilling our mission and providing the best education possible. One of the most effective ways to assess this is through external Cambridge examinations. These internationally recognized exams provide an independent and objective measure of how well our students are achieving.

Unlike school-based assessments, which can sometimes be subjective, Cambridge exams give us an honest reality check. They help us ask the critical questions: is what we are doing working? Are our students truly achieving at the high standard we aim for?


These results are not about chasing numbers for their own sake. Rather, they reflect our commitment to excellence, our dedication to our students, and our faithfulness to the mission God has given us. Clear targets provide focus, accountability, and motivation—ensuring that we do not settle for mediocrity but instead continue to strive for the very best for our students.

Cambridge assessments at every level—Primary Checkpoints in Year 6, IGCSE at Year 10 and 11, AS, and A-Level at Year 12 and 13—are like monitoring our school's pulse. They help us see where we are thriving and where we need to grow. This process of reflection and refinement is essential to our vision for education, and we are deeply thankful for the hard work of our students and teachers in pursuing these high standards.

### Primary Checkpoint Results (Year 6)

- Mathematics: Our students achieved an average score of 43 (on a scale of 0–50), well above the international average of 32 and placing them in the outstanding range.
- English: Our students achieved an average score of 40, surpassing the international average of 34 and coming just shy of the outstanding range (41–50). Well done to all our students.

Guinevere Maney and Jovel Ong also received a perfect score of 50 in English. Well done.

### IGCSE Results (Years 10 & 11)

• Just over 40% of all IGCSE results were A or A\*, a fantastic achievement reflecting our students' dedication and hard work.

### AS & A-Level Results (Years 12 & 13)

- Thomas Fryer, one of our 2024 house leaders, achieved an outstanding *two A\* grades* and set a new school record with **400 points**, just short of the maximum 420 (the next step up from 400 in the system is 420).
- 100% of our Year 13 leavers attained university entrance, marking the third time since 2019 that we have achieved this milestone.

### Attendance

Please notify the office if your child is going to be absent. You may use the Skool Loop App, or email absences@manukauchristian.school.nz. If your child is not here, we will phone you to find out where they are. Please be mindful that your child is not continually late or continually being collected early in the afternoons.

Ministry of Education standards regard regular attendance to be at 90%.

That means no more than one day off every two weeks. Students in high school are also expected to have regular attendance before they will be permitted to sit exams. Lengthy holidays in term time may be wonderful opportunities to visit family overseas or have a break, but this can have a detrimental impact on achievement.
