Dear Parents and Friends of Manukau Christian School,

As our first term draws to a close, it's pleasing to reflect on the progress our students have made. From establishing routines and schedules in the lower primary classes to completing standardised testing for baseline progress and setting goals for the year ahead, it has been a busy and productive term. Our students have embraced their learning with enthusiasm, and we are grateful for the dedication of our families and teachers in guiding them along the way.

Progress on the senior building project has been highly encouraging. I am deeply grateful for the generosity of families who have supported the school through their donations, helping to ensure the continued provision of quality Christian education for future generations. Thank you.

In my daily Bible readings with my family, we've been working through Genesis, and a theme that has really stood out to me is the difference between grabbing and receiving glory. Adam and Eve were made in the image of God, with great dignity and worth. Adam was destined to exercise dominion over the earth, to rule over every creature, and to fill and subdue the world as a great king under God. To do this faithfully, he would need the knowledge of good and evil. But this knowledge was not something to be seized. It was to be gained through obedience—through a slow, faithful growth in understanding God's will and learning what it would mean to rule God's world under His authority. But Adam and Eve didn't wait. They grasped for God-like status on their own terms. They wanted glory without obedience, exaltation without submission—but the result wasn't a rise. It was a terrible fall.

Humility is the fear of the LORD; its wages are riches and honor and life. **Proverbs 22:4**



A similar pattern emerges in the story of the Tower of Babel. Once again, humanity reaches for glory. We're told that they came together to build a tower that would reach into the heavens—grasping

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at deity, attempting to ascend to a station that wasn't theirs to ONE ANOTHER, BECAUSE, claim. Their desire is made explicit in their words: "Let us make a name for ourselves." They weren't content to receive glory; they wanted to seize it. But God's response is swift. He scatters them across the earth and confuses their language.

And right on the heels of this story, we're introduced to Abraham—a man of faith who doesn't grab, but receives. God promises him, "I will make your name great." Abraham's greatness is not achieved through self-exaltation, but as a gift from God. He receives glory, not by striving for it, but by walking in humble trust.

tension—between humility and pride, between receiving This and grabbing—runs through all of Scripture. In Daniel 4, we see Nebuchadnezzar exalt himself. He walks on the roof of his palace and boasts in his power and majesty. But God humbles him-drastically. He loses his reason, eats grass like an ox, and lives like a beast. When we try to become like gods, we actually become less than human. Pride doesn't elevate; it degrades. It lowers us to become more like brute beasts.

Romans 1 paints the same picture. People suppress the truth of God, claiming to be wise-but become fools. They exchange the glory of God for images of animals, and ultimately, their thinking becomes futile. This is the spiritual law at work in the world: when we refuse to receive from God and instead grasp at power, identity, or meaning on our own terms, we lose not only our relationship with Him-we lose ourselves.

And yet, the path of humility is radically different. "Humble yourselves before the Lord, and He will lift you up" (James 4:10). We are meant for glory. Psalm 8 says that God crowned us with glory and honour, making us just a little lower than the angels. But that glory is always received, never seized.

One of our core school virtues is humility. At Manukau Christian School, we want our students to grow into something very different from the pattern we see in a man in rebellion against God. The rebellious heart refuses to acknowledge anyone higher than himself. This is one of the great failings of our age-whether in politics, leadership, or culture-where so many refuse to recognise a higher authority, living as though they are the final standard. But we want our students to be marked by humility. No matter how gifted they may be, those gifts are given by God. And no matter how capable they become, they remain frail, fallible human beings. When they acknowledge their need for God, when they grasp His greatness and their own smallness, they are in exactly the right posture for true glory—not a self-made one, but the kind God gives.

We see this most clearly in Christ. Though He was in very nature God, He did not consider equality with God something to be grasped, but made Himself nothing, taking on the form of a servant. And *therefore*, God exalted Him and gave Him the name that is above every name. This is the pattern we want our students to follow: not grasping for greatness, but walking in faith and humility, trusting that God lifts up those who bow before Him.

In a world of grasping, let's raise young men and women who humble themselves before the Lord—and trust that He will lift them up

Entrance into Year 9 at MCS – Important Information for Parents Entrance into Year 9 at MCS is not automatic. Even current MCS students must reapply if they wish to continue into our high school program. This process is in place for several key reasons:

- It encourages families to take a step back and consider whether MCS continues to be the best educational fit for their child as they enter high school.
- It allows the school to assess whether our program and approach are suitable for each student moving forward.

Our Year 9 cohort is limited to 24 places, so we strongly encourage parents to attend our Year 9 Information Evening next term to gain a clear understanding of what high school at MCS (Years 9–13) involves.



Key Points for Parents:

- Enrolment in Year 9 requires submitting a new application for Year 9.
- All Year 8 students applying for Year 9 will sit an entrance test.
- Entry decisions are based on a range of criteria, including but not limited to:

- o The length of time a student has been at MCS.
- Academic suitability for the structured, high-expectation learning environment at MCS.
- o Attendance and behaviour
- o Alignment with our Christian worldview and values.

This process ensures fairness and maintains the strong academic and cultural expectations that define MCS high school education. If you have any questions, we encourage you to attend the Year 9 Information Evening or contact the school office. Further details will be sent out early next term.

A huge thank you to all the families that collected the Yummy Fruit Stickers last year. We were able to get more PE equipment as a result. Could you please keep collecting stickers



They carefully identified sepal, ovary, anthers, stigma, filament, stamen, and petals, deepening their understanding of plant life cycles. Additionally, they investigated seed germination, discovering what it takes for a tiny seed to sprout and grow.
